II Corinthians 1:7

The following letter was received by a pastor in Texas:

Dear Pastor,

In reply to your request to send a check, I wish to inform you that the present condition of my bank account makes it almost impossible. My shattered financial condition is due to the federal laws, state laws, county laws, corporation laws, mothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, and outlaws. Through these laws I am compelled to pay a business tax,

an amusement tax, a head tax, a school tax, a gas tax, a light tax, a water tax, and a sales tax. Even my brains are taxed.

I am required to get a business license, dog license, truck license, not mention a marriage license. I am also required to contribute to every organization or society which the genius of man is capable of bring to life: women's relief, unemployment relief, disaster relief, every hospital and charitable institution in the city, including the Red Cross, the black cross, the purple cross and the double cross.

For my own safety I am required to carry life insurance, property insurance, liability insurance, burglary insurance, accident insurance, business insurance, earthquake insurance, tornado insurance, unemployment insurance, old age insurance and fire insurance.

I am inspected, expected, disrespected, rejected, dejected, examined, reexamined, informed, reformed, summoned, fined, commanded, and compelled until I provide an inexhaustible supply of money for every known need, desire or hope of the human race.

Simply because I refuse to donate something or other, I am boycotted, talked about, lied about, held up, held down and robbed until I am ruined. I can tell you honestly that had not the unexpected happened, I could not enclose this check. The wolf that comes to so many doors nowadays just had pups in the kitchen. I sold them. HERE IS THE MONEY!

Do you get a sense of hopelessness in that letter? Suffering can do that to us.

We have been looking at Paul's encouragement to the Corinthians regarding the purpose and the results of suffering. The first purpose he identifies is that it draws us to praise. In v.3 he leads us in that praise:

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort."

In v.6 he also identifies ministry as a purpose for salvation:

"If we are afflicted, it is for your comfort and salvation; and if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which you experience when you patiently endure the same sufferings that we suffer."

The last purpose he identifies for our suffering is that it gives us hope:

"Our hope for you is unshaken, for we know that as you share in our sufferings, you will also share in our comfort." v.6

The great explorer, Sir Francis Drake once returned from one of his globe-encircling voyages and anchored his ship in the little river Thames. A dangerous storm arose and it looked like his ship might be run aground or even sunk. Someone standing near the old weatherbeaten seaman heard him say through gritted teeth, "Must I who have escaped the rage of the ocean be drowned in a ditch?"

That was a rather hopeless statement from someone who was helpless in the face of extreme circumstances. If his ship sank in that river he could do nothing to stop it. A lot of people feel that same way in the midst of suffering. They feel that there is nothing that they can do to stop it or to change it so they lose hope. I have seen vibrant, lively people brought down to the depths of depression by suffering.

What Paul tells us in v.7 is that one of the primary purposes of suffering is to teach us to hope in the right things. Note that he says that his hope for them is firmly grounded. Paul had learned that it didn't do any good to hope in laws, or companions, or earthly authorities, or even in his own reputation. If you count on those things you are destined for failure. Our hope needs to be grounded in the promises and in the practical ministry of God in our lives. That's what Paul was looking to for strength. Everything else had failed and when he had been brought all the way to the bottom of the pit he looked up and saw the promises of God reaching out to him to raise him up in victory over his severe affliction.

Paul knew the direct ministry of God that was the basis for his hope for the Corinthians, "knowing that as you are sharers of our sufferings, so also you are sharers of our comfort."

Suffering draws us to hope. It causes us to learn to let go of all of our false hopes here on earth, to hope in God and to rely on His promises. In that sense it purifies us and gets our eyes back where they should be... on Him.

After a tree fell on his garage the Rev. Ray Lanham was asked by his neighbor if there wasn't something wrong when a man of God suffers from an act of God.

Rev. Lanham told him, "I wouldn't know. I'm in sales, not management.

When we are suffering and we want to know, "Why, Lord?" we would do well to remember that fact. God is in management. He knows what we need and He knows what will be achieved by all of the circumstances of our lives. We aren't here to run the show. We're here to advertise the product, the Gospel, and we're here to make sure that everyone we meet has the opportunity to receive that Gospel. We're in sales. Suffering is one tool used by God to help us get that message out.

Suffering has purpose. It develops new qualities in us that we can't get any other way. It enhances old qualities and gives them a new look and a new appeal. It draws us to praise God in new ways. It draws us to minister to others in ways that we never thought possible. It draws us to hope in the only true hope to be found in this world.

"Why" is the wrong question. A Christian who in very difficult

circumstances fell on his knees in despair to cry to God, "*When* am I going to get out of all these trials?" But by a slip of the tongue he actually prayed, "*What* am I going to get out of all these trials?"

That should be our cry to God. Sufferings always have purpose. They are growth tools for our faith. So the next time you suffer, or if you are constantly suffering, ask yourself the question that sustained the Apostle Paul during his time of extreme suffering, "Lord, what are You building in my life, and what are You teaching me, and what are You preparing me to do for Your glory?" When we find the answer to that, then we will know the answer to the question, "Why?"

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Let your suffering build your faith!

HARLAN MOSS - PRISON LIGHTHOUSE MINISTRY May 2023

"Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God is making His appeal through us, we implore you on behalf of Christ be reconciled to God. II Cor. 5:20

God would have that none should perish, and all should come to Him in repentance. We are His ambassadors to spread the good news of salvation. Our responsibility is to share the gospel, and it is up to the Lord to save their souls after the good news is shared. It was a blessing to be able to baptize Max and Henry, (the two men I wrote about in the April newsletter), on Easter morning at the 5:30 am sunrise service! Pastor Greg gave the message, and both gave their testimony of how Jesus changed their lives. They are thankful to Christ for their new lives! Max will be getting released soon and with that comes some anxiety. We have been talking about how the Lord will take care of him if he keeps his focus on Christ, and not his difficulties. Please pray for the Lord to put Christians in Max's pathway.

Henry continues to grow in the Lord. Wednesday Bible study is comprised of men who are just coming into the prison to be processed. There are about six general population men who attend as well. I go over a Bible passage then we divide up into six groups, and GP men are the leaders of these groups. Henry is one of the leaders. It is great to see him grow in the Lord. They are truly being ambassadors for Christ!

The men who work in the laundry room are mostly Christian men. A few weeks ago, one of the Christian men asked if I could call Ben into the Chaplain's office from the laundry room. The guys there had been witnessing to him for a while. Ben told me that the Lord had been working on him for the past year. He will get out in about six months, and he did not want to go back to his old sinful life. Ben told me he was in Juvenile detention when he was 12 years old. His father wanted to take him to church, but he did not want to go. So he was put in lock down at the detention center for refusing to go with his father. Ben smiled as he said, "I was a stubborn kid, I would rather be in lock down than go to church." He did not know much about the Bible. After I explained the gospel to him, Ben wanted to invite Christ into his life and trust Him as his Lord and Savior. While we were praying, it suddenly got noisy in the hallway outside the office. After the prayer Ben told me that he felt the devil was trying to distract him during his prayer. I told him, "That is very good insight to recognize the devil's devices." When he was getting ready to leave the office I opened my Vita Minutes jar, (slips of paper with Bible verses on them) and asked him to take one. Ben picked out a verse randomly, and it was not by accident! It was Isaiah 1:18, "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; Though they are red like crimson, they shall be as wool." What a perfect verse for Ben who had just trusted Christ as his Savior! When he walked out of the church service last Thursday evening Ben said to me, "I just realized this evening as we were singing that I have not felt alone since we prayed two weeks ago!" PTL!

Please pray for those in authority. Many things seem to be uncertain for us as volunteers. I am thankful though for the favor God has given me with the staff! I have been able to go cell to cell during count if the officer in charge allows it, and they have allowed it! That has been a blessing! God is truly at work in these uncertain times!







MISSIONARY UPDATES AMANDA BENSON - PHILIPPINES



May 1, 2023 A LITTLE FAITH

I have a confession to make. It was really hard for me to send out that email two weeks ago letting you all know we had a house. I very rarely sit on an email (I almost always send it right away or schedule it to send), but I had a hard time with this one. I just saved it and came back to it the next day. And even when I pushed send, there was still doubt in my heart. What if the contract fell through (even though there have been no indicators that it would), and I had just sent out an email telling everyone we had a house? What if I asked for gifts and none came in?

You see, last year as we were looking for a house, it felt like every time there was a possibility, it fell through. We would get our hopes up, only for God to say no. But God still provided. In His perfect timing, He provided us a house that was what we needed for this one year, and He provided the funds we needed to purchase some items we needed. And yet, I found myself back in that same place again this year as we were again looking for a house. Two or three came up, but this really was the only true possibility...and was the ideal option.

As time went on, we weren't sure if we would get the house. Would the couple living there actually move out? Would we get the contract from the landlady? Would we be able to move in at the right time? Would we have the money to furnish the house?

But this year, things have been different. God kept opening the doors. The couple that was living there are parents of one of my former students who just graduated. I decided to message my student, but I didn't think it had amounted to anything. However a couple weeks later, a coworker messaged me and asked if I still wanted the house of my student's parents. We were then able to get in contact with the couple, find out when they were moving, and ask if we could purchase items from them. They were so happy that their house and their items were going to Faith Academy teachers, and when we went over Thursday to finalize everything before they moved out, she kept showing us things we hadn't purchased and said, "Free for you, since you're my daughter's teacher!" She was so nice and was a huge blessing to us as we get ready to move in.

And God continues to provide. Within a week of sending out that email two weeks ago, we had enough money to purchase everything we needed by the end of April when the couple left, as well as for much of what we need to purchase before other people move in with us this July. When I found that out, I was so overwhelmed with amazement at who God is and was also filled with humility at my lack of belief. He is so good, even when I doubt. And yet He doesn't fill me with shame, but rather lifts my head and kindly says, "You asked me to help you in your unbelief, and that's what I'm doing right now. I've got this."

Faith is a journey. There are times we doubt and there are times we

have great faith. God rewards great faith, but He also helps us in our moments of weakness. When Peter got distracted by all of the wind and waves, he called out to Jesus when he started sinking, and Jesus immediately took him by the hand and brought him into the boat (Matthew 14:22-33). And He does the same for me. And for you. We are human and we fail. But we can cry out "Lord, help my unbelief!" And I firmly believe that He is just waiting to answer that prayer.

He has for me. And I know He will continue to do so in other times when my faith falters.

As I watch God put all the pieces into place for this house, I know that He must be up to something grand. If He wasn't, why would He provide so abundantly for this ministry? His provision isn't based on me--it's completely based on Him. If He wants it to happen, He will make it happen.

Thank you so much for being a part of this ministry and this journey with me, in whatever way that is. Thank you for being used by God to help grow my faith. I know many of you pray regularly for me. Many others give regularly. Others encourage my students, coworkers, and me. All of these things are so important to the amazing work God is doing here in the Philippines and at Faith Academy.

April provided many open doors for ministry for our Central Europe CHE teams. Please delight in what the Lord is doing . . .

Food and Medicine Becomes Spiritual Food and Medicine

Except for Hungary, most Eastern European countries celebrate both Orthodox and traditional Easter. This gives increased opportunities to share about the death and resurrection of our Lord and His great love for people.

Hungarian MEK's efforts this month included Leonard Hanykovics' use of the generous NAB donations for the purchasing and delivering of desperately needed food and medical supplies to hundreds of Ukraine's war-displaced families and individuals.

These people are being cared for and sheltered by some faithful Ukrainian churches. While they are receiving the generous help, they are also hearing about the Lord who loves and provides for them.

God is answering prayers with amazing stories of safe-keeping and people coming to know Jesus. One woman shared her personal experience. She told of a Russian rocket landing in her yard but did not explode! Then another one landed beside it but again did not explode. She is seeing this as God's powerful hand in her life. We praise God for how He is working in many hearts during this devastating war.

Leonard and his wife gathered the supplies and traveled more than 2,000 km to deliver \$12,000 worth of lifesaving medicines and food to Odessa. We are very thankful to have this experienced missionary and his wife as part of the MEK team. They and other team members have also been very busy caring for and sharing Christ with displaced Ukrainians in Hungarian communities.

A Roof Opens Doors!

When an old roof caved-in on a Roma family's home in Boldog, Hungary, it brought together concerned men from the community. Working with our MEK team and a local lumberyard that supplied materials at vastly reduced cost, they rebuilt the roof and helped the devastated family remain together.

This provided an unexpected opportunity for Laci Daróczi-Csuhai's team to grow relationships with the formerly disinterested Boldog men. Discussions about the Bible and future community development projects have followed.

A Mayor Opens a Building to MEK!

Wherever we begin a CHE project in Central Europe, finding a place for the community to meet is a huge challenge. MEK has been at work in Apc, Hungary, now for almost two years, and the mayor is liking what he sees. Last month he suggested to the local board that an empty building could be used rent-free by MEK and the Roma residents if they repair and maintain it.

This will allow the MEK team to hold community meetings, Bible studies, prayer meetings, youth gatherings, and more. We thank the Lord for opening the mayor's heart, and we pray for willing Roma to

help clean up and make the building usable.

Easter Camp Draws 40 People, Age 2–20, In Donji Petrovci, Serbia

The first day of Easter camp, it snowed! The second day, it rained. The third day, it was beautiful . . . just like Jesus' resurrection!

For the ZZ Serbia team, led by Marijana Čizmanski, and for the many children and parents who attended, it was both an enjoyable and deeply spiritual time.

Because of the three unseasonably cold days, they all "camped" in the community house, where they heard about the love of God shown through Jesus' sacrifice and resurrection for them. By means of puppetry, clowning, artwork, crafts, and storytelling, the wonderful Good News was given to this mostly illiterate village. Next on the schedule: start a youth leadership team!

Fellowship is an important part of our lives as Jesus followers. It is a place for us to share our joys and sorrows, to encourage and teach one another.

Since the world shut down in 2020 because of the global pandemic, I think we have gained a deeper appreciation for and an awareness of the importance of fellowship. What a joy it has been to be able to fellowship with our brothers and sisters at Komyo Christian Church and throughout the Japan Baptist Conference (JBC).

In my last newsletter, I mentioned the youth who were taking entrance exams. At Komyo Church, we got to celebrate with one young lady who graduated from middle school and passed the entrance exam for the high school she wanted to attend. The group of older ladies at church were faithfully praying for her and loved getting to celebrate her accomplishments. One of the benefits of the fellowship of believers is the building of intergenerational relationships.

March is the end of the school year here; spring vacation is usually the last two weeks of March and often also the first week of April. This gives the youth a chance to gather for a spring camp. Although we have not yet been able to have an overnight camp, we did have a great time of fellowship, one day with the university students and young adults and one day with the junior and senior high students. Since we have students in both groups in Osaka, I got to attend both days. This year at the youth gathering the students spent time designing a T-shirt together. It has been over five years since the last design was made. The other adults and I sat back and watched the students work together, talking over designs, type of fabric, and color of fabric for the shirts. I am looking forward to seeing what they came up with! The youth also are learning the importance of fellowshipping with their peers for encouragement and fun.

Yuri and I had the privilege of leading a ladies' seminar at one of the churches I served fresh out of language school. It was their first experience with a seminar. We enjoyed time catching up and studying God's Word together. We were encouraged by their vulnerability with and kindness toward each other. What a joy to fellowship with the ladies throughout the JBC as we learn from each other about walking with Jesus daily.

What a delight it was to fellowship with the missionary community at our Kansai Christian Women's Conference in March! It was truly a privilege to teach from God's Word and spend time together in fellowship and prayer. For some of the women, this is one of the few times they get to worship in English during the year. On the feedback forms, many women were grateful for and asked for more fellowship/ small group time. Additionally, once a month several of these ladies and I gather for a time of fellowship. We call it "Bagel Breakfast" because we first started the meeting in a bagel shop. Even though that shop has closed, and we have had to move twice since then, we still have bagel breakfast once a month! Fellowship in one's heart language is also of utmost importance.

The first week of May, the JBC held its 60th annual "Deeper Life" conference. What fun to meet with our brothers and sisters from around the region as we fellowshipped, worshiped, and learned together. The speaker is the head of the only Christian university in Japan and encouraged us through his teaching and by fellowshipping

with us. The theme was "Abiding in the Lord Together." One of the statements he made that has stuck with me is, "We abide in the fellowship of the Trinity. There is no greater grace."

Thank you for your prayers and support of me and the ministry in Japan. I pray that you also are experiencing the great grace of fellowship within your church, with family and friends of all ages, with Jesus followers around your neighborhood and city, with people who speak the same language, and with people who do not.

This fall has reminded us of our mission's focus on theological 30

education. Our goal is to come alongside what God is already doing here in southern Brazil and equip those he brings to us so they can continue to proclaim the good news of his kingdom.

At the seminary this fall, Brandon has been teaching the second half of systematic theology, which focuses on the doctrines of Christ, atonement, salvation, and the future. We have around twenty students enrolled in the course, and it has been a joy to see them work through what can be complicated issues.

Just this week, while Brandon was grading papers on the atonement, he was thrilled to read about a student's journey, pondering the manyfaceted aspects of the atonement, using conversation partners from church history, such as Ireneus, Abailard, Anselm, and Martin Luther. Every week the students work through knotty issues in groups as well, forcing them to grapple with the unknown depths of the amazing faith we all share.

Our church invited us to become Sunday School teachers, which kicked off with a combined class in February. Since then, we have been working through the books of Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy with the young adults' class. This has been such a unique opportunity for us, as this class is made up of many people who are originally from other parts of Brazil and even out of the country! We have one class member from Ecuador who is working on her medical residency in our city.

Kairos Brazil will soon produce its first two graduates from the program, and we will open enrollment to our second group of students by the middle of this year. We have already had several prospective students contact us this past year, so we are praying God will bless this second group.

Marci is also continuing her studies with Kairos University, and, as

part of her module on biblical exegesis, she guest taught a class on biblical authority and theological themes in the book of Job for our seminary. The students responded well to the material and assignments.

On the homefront, we have been so proud of Daniel, Monica, and Olivia with their efforts in school. Daniel has excelled as a student and worker. Monica and Olivia both have had excellent grades too, as they have been pushed rather hard given they are working on their first years of high school and middle school respectively.

For the last half of April, we were able to enjoy something a little different. The vice president of International Missions for the NAB, Kerry Bender, spent a couple weeks here in Porto Alegre. He taught a two-week class on homiletics, and on one of the Sundays he was here he preached at our church. It was a joy to get to know him more deeply, as we were able to host him for some meals. And he even cooked a couple meals for us!

On the last night of his visit, he joined us and many others to celebrate our Field Director, Lyndell Campbell-Réquia, who has now been serving in Brazil for over twenty years! We spent a Saturday evening worshiping God in both Portuguese and English, focusing on Lyndell's favorite verses from Proverbs 3:3–6.



These last three months have been particularly busy because we have been catching up from the one month away we had at the beginning of the year.

Rick is still trying to recover from the backlog of cases that he met on returning. Turnaround time on cases still needs to improve. Tissue processing was slowed down due to inferior solutions provided by local suppliers. He is more than ready to have Dr. Mbanga, the pathologist being trained in Kenya, join him. As you have been aware, Dr. Mbanga was finally able to present his research project/ thesis. We are now waiting for the oral and written exam schedule to be posted at the University of Nairobi where he has been studying. Pray this gets set, he passes the exams and gets back to Cameroon as soon as possible. We did have a lovely surprise last week. Dr. Mbanga appeared in the pathology lab! He decided while waiting for

his exams, which will hopefully be set in June, he would take time to visit his family whom he hasn't seen in over three years due to COVID and visa problems. He worked with Rick in the lab for a few days, which was great!

For Debbie, as of September of last year, she took on a new job for her HIV outpatient department. She has been responsible for submitting claims for all the patients' charges so that the hospital can be reimbursed by the HIV Free program. These expenses involve registration fees, lab charges, files, etc. She also lost ground and has played catch-up until now. Her prayer request is for someone she can train to help and eventually take over this work, so she has more time to share Scripture and pray with her patients.

The exciting news these days is the Cancer / Radiation Therapy Center project is making progress. The bunker to house the linear accelerator is well underway. An engineer from Canada is involved and has been making several visits to ensure thing go well. Pray this project is completed well.

Also, please pray for our water supply. This dry season has taken its toll on our water table, and we are having regular water shortages, even with the rains coming last month. Pray the maintenance team can solve the problems and there can be enough water to supply our hospital and living quarters around.

BELARUS: Seven Young Christians Fined

A court in Minsk has fined seven young Christians the equivalent of two months' average wages each. The charges were laid against the believers as punishment for talking to others about the meaning of Easter on April 15th, the day before Orthodox Easter Sunday.

The young people were charged for organizing "a demonstration or mass event," even though they were merely speaking with individuals on the street. When governing officials were asked to explain the reasons for the arrests and fines, they refused to comment. The Christians were fined the maximum penalty allowable under the statute. It appears that the believers have chosen not to appeal their sentences.

Five of the seven Christians who received charges are members of the New Life Church, which has faced repeated incidents of persecution over the years and was sealed by the authorities in February 2021.

Pray for God's provision on behalf of the young believers

who have been fined for sharing their faith. May He give them wisdom, courage and peace as they face the charges, as well as the strength required to continue carrying out Christ's call to spread the Gospel message. In general, pray for the ongoing ministry of other Christians throughout Belarus who are also encountering ongoing hostility from governing officials. Ask the Lord to bring conviction to those who oppose His Word so their hearts will be stirred towards repentance and the need to receive His eternal salvation.

REPORT UPDATES

IRAN: Christian Couple Acquitted

Homayoun Zhaveh, a 64-year-old Christian with advanced Parkinson's disease, and his wife, Sara Ahmadi, have thankfully been acquitted by an Iranian court and released from prison. On April 9th, it was reported that their application for a retrial had been accepted. On May 9th, the appeal court judge found no evidence that either of these Christians had acted against national security, as initially accused.

In his ruling, the judge stated that gathering with people of one's own faith is "natural," and that having books relating to Christianity is "an extension of their beliefs." However, many of the Christians presently in Iranian prisons are there because of their participation in house churches.

Sara and Homayoun were arrested in June 2019. Sara was initially sentenced to 11 years, which was later reduced to eight years in December 2020. Yet, both of them were allowed to remain at home until August 2022, the time they were summoned to Evin Prison and subsequently detained. Sara and Homayoun were finally released the evening after the recent court announcement.

Praise God for this very positive outcome! Pray that the recent court ruling will serve as a precedent in determining the outcome of cases involving Christians still imprisoned in Iran. May the ruling also result in the general ceasing of governmental oppression towards followers of Jesus throughout the country. As for Homayoun's health concerns, please pray that he will experience God's healing touch; and that, during his recovery, Sara will be strengthened while assisting with his medical needs.

NIGERIA: More Chibok Girls Rescued

In 2014, a secondary school in the predominantly Christian town of Chibok, Borno State, was attacked by members of the militant Islamic group, Boko Haram. During the raid, 276 girls were kidnapped. In the nine years since that time, some of the girls have been released, while others either managed to escape or were rescued by governmental forces. Although the exact number of students who remain missing is unknown, it is estimated that approximately 100 of them are still in captivity.

Over the years, as the families continued to hope and pray for the recovery of their missing girls, at least 38 parents have died without witnessing their daughters' safe return home. Others are left wondering whether their abducted loved ones are still alive and, if so, where they are located.

In a recent announcement, Nigerian authorities were pleased to present two more surviving girls, Hauwa Maltha and Esther Marcus, who were rescued in April. Hauwa, who was over eight months pregnant when she was recovered, has since given birth to her baby on April 28th. During captivity, Hauwa was forcibly married three times to different Boko Haram members.

When announcing the return of these two young women, the military commander stated that a total of 14 girls have been recently rescued. Although he gave the names of each one, no further details on the recovery of these students were released. It is assumed that both Hauwa and Esther became mothers while in captivity, as they were seen with children after their rescues.

The homecoming of the 14 recently rescued young women brought joy to so many; yet, at the same time, it also created a renewed sense of pain for the families whose girls have not been recovered to date. "It has made the memories fresh for the parents [whose] children are still missing," states Hassan Chibok, a local Nigerian leader.

Added Note: In a separate report just released this week, it was announced that yet another missing schoolgirl, Saratu Dauda, was found on May 6th by Nigerian troops. Regrettably, Saratu's three children remain in the custody of her former captor, Abu Yusuf, the Boko Haram member she was forced to marry while in captivity. Abu serves the terrorist group as an explosives expert. The country's officials have stated that they are endeavoring to rescue Saratu's children, along with any others they locate.

Saratu was taken to the hospital for treatment and has since been released. She is planning to complete her secondary and university education with the support of the state government. During the announcement of her rescue, Major General Ibrahim Ali proclaimed: "We thank God for rescuing Saratu Dauda. This will enable [her] to have a better life with [her] parents and other families in [the] Chibok community."

Along with the rejoicing families and friends of the recently rescued students, we can give thanks to our Heavenly Father that these girls are now safely home. Pray that each one of them will receive God's ministry of healing – both physically and emotionally – from the aftermath of the kidnapping and subsequent captivity. Ask the Lord to also provide guidance to these young women and their families as they endeavor to integrate back into their communities, some now having to raise the young children who were fathered and born in the terrorists' camps. Last, but not least, please continue to pray for the rescue and well-being of Chibok schoolgirls who remain missing, along with other kidnapped victims presently being held hostage by militant groups across Nigeria.
