

"But I call God to witness against me – it was to spare you that I refrained from coming again to Corinth. Not that we lord it over your faith, but we work with you for your joy, for you stand firm in your faith."

II Corinthians 1:23-24

Certain events are etched into all of our minds. Many of us can remember where we were and what we were doing during tragic events. For example, people can still tell you where they were when Kennedy was shot. Most people can tell you what they were doing when the World Trade Center buildings went down. When the space shuttle Challenger lifted into the sky and blew up 73 seconds into its Email your article: jbybeditor@hotmail.com 1 flight, we faced one of those events that we can never forget. Most of us remember the videotape of that terrible moment. We can re-create the picture in our minds of a deep blue sky marked with twisted trails of smoke and large chunks of metal plummeting toward the ocean. And we know, as we recall the grim specter of the explosion, that among the falling pieces were the bodies of some of America's finest men and women.

What we don't remember is that the investigations into the cause of that tragedy pointed out some serious shortfalls in human judgment and materials management. The New York Times put it bluntly: "The ultimate cause of the space shuttle disaster was pride. A group of top managers failed to listen carefully to the warnings of those down the line who were concerned about the operational reliability of certain parts of the booster rocket under conditions of abnormal stress. The people in charge were confident that they knew best and that they should not change the launch schedules. They were wrong."

The issue is integrity. I would guess that if we had been able to question each of those top-level managers before that disaster we would have found that, to a person, they would have claimed to be people of integrity. Yet few would agree with that assessment now. Their integrity was thoroughly discredited in one explosion that rocked the nation. It does no good to claim to have integrity if the claim is not followed up with actions that display it to others.

Last month we saw Paul defending his claim to be a man of integrity. The claim had to be followed up with action. That is what we find as we continue on in II Corinthians." Integrity is displayed most vividly in our compassionate acts towards others." Paul understood that we have to do more than just talk about integrity: we have to show it. Our acts of compassion show it more clearly than any other works. So in II Corinthians 1:23–2:4 Paul goes on to talk about three of his acts of compassion toward the Corinthians that proved his claims of integrity.

Paul begins by talking about acts of servanthood. A man was struggling to get to Grand Central Station in New York City. The wind blew fiercely, and the rain beat down on him as he lugged his two heavy suitcases toward the terminal. Occasionally he would pause to rest and regain his strength before trudging on against the elements.

At one point he was almost ready to collapse, when a man suddenly appeared by his side, took the suitcases, and said in a strangely familiar voice, "We are going the same way. You look as if you could use some help." When they had reached the shelter of the station, the weary traveler, the renowned educator Booker T. Washington, asked the man, "Please, sir, what is your name?" The man replied, "The name, my friend, is Roosevelt. Teddy Roosevelt."

The greatest essence of servanthood is found in someone who is strong reaching down to help someone who is struggling. There is no greater compassionate act of integrity.

What we find in vv.23–24 is that the apostle Paul, who arguably held one of the strongest positions in the church, willingly put himself in the position of being a servant to the Corinthians because of his integrity toward them. The important thing to remember is that Paul knew what it meant to suffer. In v.8 he described a time of suffering that was so severe that he believed he was going to die. He had endured pain and stress that he would not wish on anyone else. That experience of suffering had a great effect on his actions toward the Corinthians. He didn't want to have to put them through anything close to the suffering he had experienced.

The charges had been made that Paul had vacillated in his travel

plans. In I Corinthians he had given them one itinerary. Later, he had given them other plans. Then his final journey did not look like either one. Paul's critics claimed that he did this because it was not in his best interest to go to Corinth at the time. Paul turns that around and shows how his change in plans had actually been an act of compassionate servanthood.

His discussion hinges around the phrase: "... To spare you I refrained from coming again to Corinth." Don't forget that Paul was an apostle. That office carried with it some unpleasant duties, one of which was rebuking and chastening backslidden believers. He made that clear in I Corinthians 4:21 when he asked them, "Shall I come to you with a rod or with love in a spirit of gentleness?" He follows that question up in I Corinthians 5 with an illustration of what it meant to use the apostle's rod. At times an apostle was required to wield the rod of discipline. This was another one of those times.

The Corinthians had made a lot of progress in their spiritual growth, and they were continuing to make a lot of progress. But there were some major issues that they had not dealt with completely. There were still some very evident sins within the body that needed to be cleansed. They were working on it, but they had not made it yet.

Here is Paul's dilemma. Those areas that the Corinthians were working on so slowly were significant. If he went to Corinth he was bound, as an apostle, to confront those problems with a rod of discipline. That would bring suffering into their lives, and he was very sensitive to that fact. If he stayed away, they could continue with their present action. The fact that they are dealing with their sin is emphasized in v.24 where Paul says that they are standing firm in their faith.

What swayed his decision was his servant's heart. He could have gone in and taken over and dealt with the sin in the church. But that would have only established him as a dictator over the church. The people would not have grown because they would not have to make the hard decisions about right and wrong. Paul would be making those decisions for them. Paul wasn't in the business of maintaining a nursery. His desire was for the Corinthian church to grow into a body that was spiritually mature in Christ. He didn't want robots, he wanted people who were mature enough to minister and serve the Lord on their own. The greatest service he could perform for them was to delay his visit and give them room to grow. That is why he lays out his heart in v. 24 and tells them that he did not want to lord it over them, he wanted to work with them. He didn't want to order them around, he wanted to help them grow.

His change in travel plans was not vacillation, it was an act of compassionate integrity. One of the most important goals of Paul's ministry was to see others grow into maturity in Christ. As a servant he did all that he could to promote that growth. By staying away from Corinth, he allowed that growth to continue. He chose to serve them rather than to oppress them as a dictator. It was a compassionate act that clearly displayed his integrity as an apostle. Next month we will look at the two other acts of compassion that proved Paul's integrity.

MISSIONARY UPDATES AMANDA BENSON - PHILIPPINES

A FAMILY'S MINISTRY

Faith Academy (FA) was started to support missionary families in Southeast Asia. This has always been the vision of FA throughout the years, though what that has looked like has changed significantly in the last 10 or so years. In those years, our number of Filipino students has significantly increased, now making it one of our students' top three ethnicities. Many of the Filipino families are not missionaries, though many of them are in Christian ministry. This past month, I had the privilege of attending a seminar, put on by the parents of one of my new students, where they shared all about their ministry/business.

One of the family's ministries is called LeadOut Coaching & Consultancy. LeadOut is designed to help organizations guide their companies with integrity and on the foundation of the gospel. One message that was shared loud and clear was that we are not to separate our faith from our everyday lives. As we follow Christ, it should be intertwined into everything we do, including our work. The head of a famous sports company in the Philippines, Toby's

Sports, shared his testimony of working with LeadOut and how their company wasn't originally founded as a "Christian company," but they are working to change that now. It was amazing to think of how my student's family and their company is working so intentionally with so many influential people in the Philippines to spread the gospel to their employees and build workplaces based on the gospel.

I was really struck by this conference, as usually I think of the missionaries that I am supporting while working here and how what I am doing here allows them to be on the field doing what God has called them to do. And being here most definitely does that. But the Lord showed me how me being here also allows Filipinos to continue the work that God has called them to do in their home country. It reminds me that all believers are called to serve the Lord wherever we are at. We don't have to go overseas to do that, though some are called to. But even those who are not called to go overseas are called to be intentional about spreading the gospel and growing in Christ each and every day.

I'm so grateful to be here and to be able to serve not only the missionaries, but also the Filipinos who have chosen to send their children to Faith Academy. I love so much that I get to be a part of teaching them what it means to follow Christ, through good and bad. And I'm also thankful for everyone of you who is a part of this mission through your prayers, financial support, and encouragement.

I can't wait to see what God is going to do this year, not just in and through me, but also through the families of the students I teach. He has some great things planned!

- THE LONG-AWAITED PRAISE!!!!!!! Dr. Mbanga has completed his exams and is now a full-time pathologist here at MBH!
- The hospital vehicles have been allowed to make the trip to Bamenda and back to pick up and take back patients, even in a 2.5-month road lockdown.
- Debbie has been able to work some days in the clinic these past 3 month, and a big praise for Violet who after many years of coming has decided to follow Jesus.

Prayer

- Pray for Dr. Mbanga to start well and learn quickly under Rick's mentorship.
- Pray for open roads and open market (we have been in lockdown for 2.5 months).
- Pray for our administration to have divine insight and guidance as

to how to keep the hospital going, especially financially and keeping needed supplies in stock. The water tank and Radiation Therapy Center are on hold for now due to supplies not being able to reach here.

These last 2 and a half months were probably some of the hardest months, and yet months of many blessings in ministry. We have been in a lockdown of roads and market for most of the last 2 and a half months. Praise the Lord our hospital vehicles have been allowed on the roads and have brought patients from Bamenda each day, usually two trips each day. We have 2 buses donated by Samaritan's Purse and another by Smile Train. There is a long line to get on a bus every morning in Bamenda, we are told. The other way patients have gotten here is by walking, and we even had one come by wheelbarrow pushed by friends. It reminded me of the friends that hoisted their paralyzed friend down through the ceiling of where Jesus was preaching for him to heal!

The next story is about a young man named Diligent, who had very painful keloid scars from where he had been burned when he fell into a fire in their outdoor kitchen when he was younger. He couldn't sleep due to the pain. He recently had surgery to remove the keloids and had a full-thickness skin graft to fill the gap. This was on the back of his leg right below his buttocks. Not an easy place to heal. He had a good outcome. We got to know him since he was in our hospital for over a month. He and his mother came to visit in our home after his discharge. Diligent comes from a needy family, and they were not able to afford this type of surgery and long stay. It was through our 16 supporters that we were able to help them out. We want you to feel a part of Diligent's success story!

The next great story is about one of the youths in our church, Bernice. She needed a sponsor to send her to Youth Evangelism Camp. We had the privilege to help her be able to go. She attended a training in the capital city and then was sent out to another city to lead VBS groups in different neighborhoods for the summer. She grew a lot spiritually and got to see how the Lord worked in many children's hearts through her. They reached 759 children during their VBS weeks, with 55 making decisions for Christ.

Then there is Sam, the little boy who survived 2 CPR resuscitations when he was suffering from a serious pneumonia. After Sam had been in the hospital for almost 2 months, he was still oxygen dependent. He needed an oxygen concentrator that didn't require constant electricity, because where he lives they often don't have it. So, Debbie researched and found one company that made a rechargeable portable unit with 2 batteries that would last up to 12 hours. Dr. Koch, a volunteer ENT surgeon, was able to provide the unit and brought it to Mbingo last month. Because of this, Sam was able to leave the hospital and is now at home!

Hellos and Goodbyes

A big welcome to Dr. Mbanga, who has completed his studies and now has joined Rick as the first Cameroonian pathologist at MBH, and throughout the CBC!!! And then there were no other expat missionaries on the compound! But praise the Lord, Jackie came yesterday and 3 others to follow next month.

"But others fell on good ground and yielded a crop: some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty." Matthew 13:8

The Good Shepherd goes after the one lost sheep and brings it into His fold! We do not know who will trust Christ as their Savior. Our part is to sow the seed of the gospel, not knowing if the seed is falling on good soil or stony ground. Hebrews 4:12 tells us of the power of the Word of God, which touches the very heart of our being! Ecclesiastes 3:11 says that God put eternity in everyone's heart. How awesome is our God!

I had the privilege of filling in for a pastor who usually does the Thursday afternoon Bible study at Unit C (minimum unit). I knew one of the men who attended from three years ago when I stopped by his cell in Administrative Segregation. He was not interested in Christianity, but sometimes he would take some Christian literature. Now he is excited about Jesus and studying the Bible! He said, "I can't believe how my thinking has changed from how I used to think, but I have a long way to go." What a change from when I knew him before. Isaiah 55:11 says, "So shall My word that goes out from My mouth, it shall not return to Me empty."

I had the opportunity to visit an inmate in the hospital several times. The first time he was not responsive, so I said a prayer for him before I left. The second time he was more responsive, and told me how much he appreciated my prayers and visits. The third time he told me, "I know it was the prayers and God's timing in getting me to the hospital on time that saved my life. When I get back to the prison, I will be telling everyone how God saved my life, through the prayers that were prayed for me. Thank you so much for visiting me and praying for me!" God shows His power in many different circumstances!

Joe was really depressed as he thought about his life of 50 years. Joe was born into a difficult situation. His mother was a prostitute, and he did not know his father. When he was seven years old his mother was murdered in a tragic way. He went into foster homes until he was 15, when his uncles picked him up and told him, "You are old enough to come with us and help us with our business." Their business was dealing drugs. From that time on he was in a lot of trouble and saw many bad things happen. Joe stated, "I should not be alive, and I do not understand why God kept me alive. I cannot understand why God would allow anyone to go through all the bad things I have experienced in my life. I have no doubt there is a God, but I don't understand Him." We talked about sin and the bad things it causes people to do. We conversed about how God works in our lives today, and that God had protected him many times from death. Joe acknowledged that he had to surrender it all to the Lord. Joe prayed for God to forgive him for all the sins he had committed. He said he felt like a burden was lifted from him. Praise God for His sustaining protection, and the power to change lives!

PAKISTAN: Pastor Shot in Jaranwala

On August 16th, protests by thousands of angry Muslims in the Christian colony of Jaranwala resulted in damages to hundreds of homes and over 20 churches.

While the intense violence has been quelled, tensions persist throughout the region, and the anti-Christian sentiment which fueled the violence remains. Eleazar Sidhu serves as the pastor of the Myong-Sang Naserth Church in Jaranwala, which was one of the many churches attacked in the riots. On August 28th, Islamic slogans were painted on the wall of the church building, including a curse against Pastor Eleazar. This vandalism was reported to the police and the writing has since been painted over.

A few days later, a group of people intercepted Pastor Eleazar and threatened to kill him because he had removed the writing. On September 3rd, the church leader was returning to his home when two unidentified men approached him. Pulling out a pistol, one demanded that Pastor Eleazar recite the Kalima (the Islamic declaration of faith). When the pastor instead began reciting the Apostles' Creed, the man shot him in the upper chest and then fled.

Pastor Eleazar was taken to the hospital, where doctors were able to remove the bullet. While he lost a lot of blood, the pastor is now considered to be out of danger and, thankfully, recovering well after surgery. The incident has led to renewed concerns regarding the safety of Christians in the area. Police guards have been deployed at churches, but there is scepticism about whether this will be an effective means of protecting worshippers at risk.

Pray for the complete healing of Pastor Eleazar, asking that this Christian leader and his family members will tangibly sense God's comforting presence throughout his recovery. Praise the Lord that there have been no reported casualties due to the ongoing religious tensions in Jaranwala. Please pray for the Lord's protection over His people in this troubled city, as well as those residing in other areas within the nation of Pakistan. Also ask for His intervention in the affairs of the country so that the blasphemy laws, which are so commonly abused, will be revoked.

NIGERIA: Pastor Killed in Kaduna State

Violence perpetrated by various terrorist groups has been continuing unabated in Nigeria, particularly against Christians. Even with increased security measures in place, Islamic militants continue to conduct deadly raids on Christian communities. A report released in April indicated that over 50,000 followers of Jesus have died and over 18,000 churches were set ablaze since the Boko Haram insurgency began in 2009. Those numbers continue to rise, particularly with the increasing attacks by Islamic Fulani groups.

On August 23rd, Pastor Jeremiah Mayau from the Tawaliu Baptist Church was shot and killed by unknown assailants while he was working in his agricultural field. At the time of publishing this report, details surrounding the attackers' identities and motives remain unknown. Rev. Joseph John Hayab, who serves as the chair for the Kaduna chapter of the Christian Association of Nigeria, refers to the attack as "barbaric." In his statement addressing the incident, Rev. Joseph called on security agencies to exercise greater vigilance to halt this type of activity in the state.

May God provide greatly needed comfort to the loved ones, friends and church family of Pastor Jeremiah during this time of mourning. Pray that the members of the Tawaliu Baptist Church will remain steadfast in their faith, receiving strength, vigour and encouragement from the Lord as they faithfully reach out to the members of their community with the message of eternal life through Jesus Christ. Additionally, pray that Nigerian authorities would not only bring those responsible for this attack to justice, but that there would also be increased vigilance among the country's security forces in providing protection to our vulnerable Christian brothers and sisters.

CHINA: New Laws Tighten Grip on Churches

The Chinese Communist Party (CCP) has released new religious restrictions which took effect on September 1st, bringing added concerns in a country already experiencing increased repressive measures. The new rules require religious venues to submit to the

leadership of the CCP and its plans for the "sinicization" of religion.

According to the State Administration for Religious Affairs, all religious activities will be limited to official venues only and religious symbols must not be displayed outdoors. In recent years, more than 1,500 crosses have been torn down from officially recognized churches in the Zhejiang province alone. It is expected that such enforcements will increase under these new rules.

The new regulations also put further stipulations on the preaching taking place in government-approved churches. For example, pastors' sermons must now reflect China's politics and the values of President Xi Jinping, demonstrating their full support for the Communist Party of China and its socialist system. Any clergy members refusing to comply face disqualification from preaching.

While such regulations are specifically aimed at the official Three-Self churches, the policies will undoubtedly be used against underground churches that have refused to be placed under government control.

Prayerfully uphold those who are seeking to share the message of the Gospel in this increasingly repressive nation, asking the Lord to grant them wisdom and discretion. Please also remember our Chinese brothers and sisters in Christ who currently remain imprisoned for their faith, praying that they will be granted divinely appointed opportunities to minister to others around them. Finally, pray that God will work mightily in the hearts of China's leaders, including President Xi Jinping, leading each one to repentance and a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

ERITREA: Imprisoned Christians and their families in Eritrea!

Eritrea's totalitarian regime specifically targets Christians and often imprisons them indefinitely. VOM contacts in Eritrea have reported

police raids on church meetings. Christians who dare to ignore government warnings and gather with other believers are taken to prison. Not long ago, 17 Christians were arrested for gathering to pray. Then, a week later, 25 more believers were arrested. And this time the news was even more heart-rending: Eight of those arrested were children. Today, almost 400 Eritrean believers are being held without charge in prisons, underground cells or metal shipping containers. You can be the hands and feet of Christ, serving our persecuted brothers and sisters in Christ. Our Christian brothers and sisters in Eritrea, a nation in East Africa governed by a totalitarian regime, urgently need our prayers and help. Churches that are not among the government's approved religions must meet secretly. Christians who worship in government-banned congregations are regarded as enemies of the state and face imprisonment. There are thought to be more than 350 Christians in prison in Eritrea. The conditions inside these "prisons" are some of the harshest in the world. Christian prisoners are provided meager rations and held in shipping containers in extreme desert conditions - searing heat by day and bitter cold by night. Others have been held in underground cells without light or ventilation. Some who have refused to renounce their faith in Christ have been kept behind bars for more than 15 years. Christian prisoners are held without charge and without trials, and they are forbidden from seeing their families. When prisoners are released, they are blacklisted by the government. They are unable to get jobs and are watched constantly. These faithful brothers and sisters in Christ often need extended physical and emotional help. And their family members may also lose opportunities. After years of relentless persecution, Eritrean Christians are in desperate need of prayer.

This summer was very 'hot' in the good sense of the word. Our church was able to participate in three camps for families of fallen soldiersthree children's camps in different regions of our country and several camps for teenagers and children. A special blessing for all of us was the stationary children's camp, which took place from July 31 to Aug 8, 2023 at our base in the village of Baranne, Dubno district. Without your financial support, we would not have been able to organize this camp!

Thank you very much for your donation. It has caused great praise to the Lord among all of us, especially among the children and their families! The pandemic and the war did not allow us to hold stationary camps for a long time. This year, God's miracle happened, thanks to you, among other things! The beautiful nature, favorable weather, wonderful spiritual and emotional atmosphere, and good preparation of our team-all this influenced the children so much that no one wanted to go home, but asked for a continuation.

The total number of children was 93-20 of them were from disadvantaged families and 10 whose parents were killed in the Russian-Ukrainian war. Every evening, pastors from our church came to preach and talk to the children about the topic of the day. Our youth music group...inspired the kids to praise God in a special way! When I arrived on the last evening, 7 boys (ages 12-14) came up to me and confessed that they had repented of their sins and wanted to testify to it publicly. At the final meeting, they were greeted with applause by the whole camp, and a fervent prayer of praise to God for the wonderful event was offered. Our sisters and brothers also worked in the kitchen, so the camp had home-cooked, high-quality food and a friendly atmosphere. After the camp, the children continue to come to Bible studies and weekly clubs held in our church!

Dear friends, servants of God, we are immensely grateful to you for the tremendous financial support of our church's ministry in the time of war! May God reward you a hundredfold for your sacrifice and glorify his name even more in our joint work for him! May God bless you, your team, your families and churches!
